A Journey Through Freemasonry

Rudyard Kipling, the celebrated English writer and poet born on December 30, 1865, in Bombay, British India, had a profound connection to Freemasonry. His initiation into the Hope and Perseverance Lodge No. 782 in 1885 marked the beginning of a lifelong affiliation with the fraternity.
