One of the duties of the Senior Deacon is to ‘Welcome and Clothe visiting Brethren’. One facet of that duty which I take particular pleasure in is ensuring our Visitors sign the Visitors Register, a hardcover ledger located in the lobby on top of the Tiler’s desk. Brethren complete the record of their visit by entering the following information: the Month/Date/Year, their Full name, Name of their Lodge, the City in which the Lodge is located (State and/or County as appropriate). When I see a Brother of another Lodge, I always inquire whether they’ve signed our Register. It may seem to be trivial, but the joy is in knowing, whether it be the 1st or 50th visit to Suffolk 60, that a Brother has taken the time to travel to be with us.

If one takes the time to peruse Page 1 of the Register, you will see that it once belonged to Dongan Patent Lodge #1134, who, at the time of the first entry, was located in Medford. They now meet in Smithtown at the same building as Smithtown Lodge #1127. The earliest record in is dated March 25, 1975 – almost 50 years ago! The earliest signature of a Suffolk 60 member was of Otto Jung dated 5/13/1975. The Register remained in the possession of Dongan Patent until 2009 or 2010 as the first visiting signatures to our Lodge are dated in 2011.

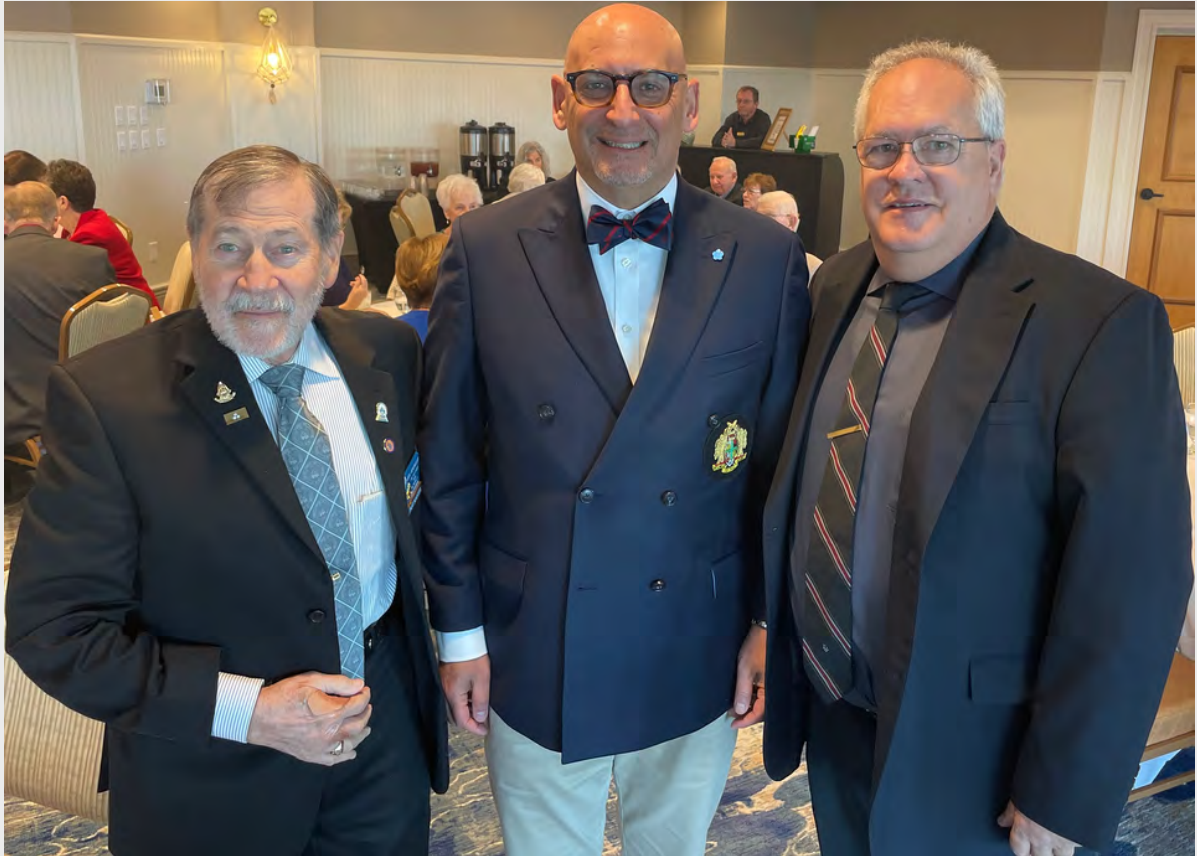
2024 has more signatures than the last 10 years combined!

THE LODGE AS EGREGORE

I learned a new word in recent years—egregore. I thank W:. Pace for repeatedly bringing this word to my attention.

The term comes from the Greek word *égré goros* (ἐγρήγορος), meaning "watcher" or "one who is awake." It was later adopted into esoteric and occult traditions, particularly in Western mysticism and Theosophy, where it took on a deeper meaning. An egregore is a collective thought-form, an entity created by the shared beliefs, emotions, and intentions of a group. It is an emergent spiritual or energetic presence that arises when individuals unite with a common purpose, reinforcing and shaping the consciousness of the group itself.

In the context of a lodge, an egregore is more than just the sum of its members' efforts—it is the living essence of the lodge itself, built and sustained by generations of brothers who have contributed their thoughts, rituals, and devotion to the Craft. It exists in the sacred space of our temple, in the echoes of our ceremonies, in the bonds we forge, and in the traditions we uphold.
