THE MAN IN THE ARENA

Theodore Roosevelt delivered the speech entitled "Citizenship in a Republic" at the Sorbonne in Paris on April 23, 1910. The speech is popularly known as "The Man in the Arena." The following is an excerpt which W Lunarola quoted at last Thursday's Installation of

It is not the critic who counts; not the man who points out how the strong man stumbles, or where the doer of deeds could have done them better. The credit belongs to the man who is actually in the arena, whose face is marred by dust and sweat and blood; who strives valiantly; who errs, who comes short again and again, because there is no effort without error and shortcoming; but who does actually strive to do the deeds; who knows the great enthusiasms, the great devotions; who spends himself in a worthy cause; who at the best knows in the end the triumph of high achievement, and who at the worst, if he fails, at least fails while daring greatly, so that his place shall never be with those cold and timid souls who neither know victory nor defeat. Shame on the man of cultivated taste who permits refinement to develop into fastidiousness that unfits him for doing the rough work of a workaday world. Among the free peoples who govern themselves there is but a small field of usefulness open for the men of cloistered life who shrink from contact with their fellows. Still less room is there for those who deride or slight what is done by those who actually bear the brunt of the day; nor yet for those others who always profess that they would like to take action, if only the conditions of life were not exactly what they actually are. The man who does nothing cuts the same sordid figure in the pages of history, whether he be cynic, or fop, or voluptuary. There is little use for the being whose tepid soul knows nothing of the great and generous emotion, of the high pride, the stern belief, the lofty enthusiasm, of the men who quell the storm and ride the thunder. Well for these men if they succeed; well also, though not so well, if they fail, given only that they have nobly ventured, and have put forth all their heart and strength. It is war-worn Hotspur, spent with hard fighting, he of the many errors and the valiant end, over whose memory we love to linger, not over the memory of the young lord who "but for the vile guns would have been a valiant soldier.

THE SEVEN LAMPS OF ARCHITECTURE

The "Seven Lamps of Architecture" is a term coined by the influential British architect John Ruskin in his book of the same name, published in 1849. Ruskin believed that architecture should adhere to certain principles in order to be truly great. He identified seven essential qualities or "lamps" that should guide architectural design. These seven lamps are metaphorical and represent key principles. Here are the "Seven Lamps of Architecture" according to Ruskin:

- 1. The Lamp of Sacrifice: This principle emphasizes the idea that architecture should reflect the dedication and commitment of the architect. It suggests that architects should be willing to make sacrifices in their designs to achieve the highest standards.
- **3. The Lamp of Truth:** This principle emphasizes the importance of honesty and sincerity in architectural design. Ruskin believed that buildings should be truthful in their materials, construction techniques, and overall expression.
- **3. The Lamp of Power:** This principle focuses on the idea that architecture should convey a sense of strength and stability. It suggests that buildings should exhibit a robustness and durability that inspires confidence.
- **4. The Lamp of Beauty:** This principle highlights the importance of aesthetics in architecture. Ruskin believed that buildings should be visually appealing and possess a sense of harmony, proportion, and elegance.

- **6. The Lamp of Memory:** This principle emphasizes the importance of historical continuity and cultural heritage in architectural design. Ruskin believed that buildings should incorporate elements of the past, reflecting a connection to history and a sense of rootedness.
- 7. **The Lamp of Obedience:** This principle suggests that architects should respect and adhere to the laws of nature, both in terms of structural integrity and environmental sustainability. It emphasizes the need for designs that are in harmony with the natural world.

These "lamps" serve as a philosophical framework for understanding the principles that Ruskin believed were essential for creating meaningful and timeless architecture.

Bro. Theodore "Teddy" Roosevelt Circa 1885

Theodore "Teddy" Roosevelt (1858–1919) was the 26th President of the United States from 1901 to 1909. A Progressive reformer, Roosevelt earned a reputation as a "trust buster" through his regulatory reforms and antitrust prosecutions. He was also an avid conservationist, setting aside more Federal land for national parks and nature preserves than all of his predecessors combined.

Roosevelt was born in New York City into a wealthy family. He suffered from severe asthma as a child, which led to a lifelong interest in physical fitness. He attended Harvard College, where he developed a passion for naval affairs. After serving as the Assistant Secretary of the Navy under President William McKinley, Roosevelt left the position to lead the Rough Riders during the Spanish-American War, earning national fame.

He became President after McKinley's assassination in 1901. As President, Roosevelt's Square Deal domestic policies aimed for fairness for all. He initiated the construction of the Panama Canal, increased regulation of businesses, and implemented policies to protect consumers.

Roosevelt was indeed a Freemason. He was initiated into Matinecock Lodge No. 806, in Oyster Bay, New York, in 1901, the same year he became president. His Masonic membership reflected his belief in civic duty, social engagement, and a moral code, all of which also informed his political philosophy.

After his presidency, Roosevelt embarked on numerous adventures, including an African safari and an exploration of the Amazon rainforest. His attempts to return to politics were unsuccessful, and he died in 1919. Despite this, Roosevelt's vigorous personality, robust masculinity, and enduring accomplishments continue to make him a popular figure in American history.
